Alro History

1884

Louis Glick Early Years

Louis Glick, an immigrant from Hungary who arrived in Saginaw, Michigan at the age of five months in 1884, was a part of a wave of hundreds of thousands of European immigrants in search of the American Dream. After working various jobs, including selling newspapers as a child, Louis gained experience in the scrap metal business. In 1916, he moved to Jackson, Michigan with a sledgehammer, chisel, \$800 and a mind for business. Louis and his brother-in-law purchased a scrap yard in 1917 for \$15,000 including land, two horses and two wagons which they would name Glick & Schpok. Just a few years later his brother-in-law would pass away leaving Louis the sole owner of the renamed Glick Iron & Metal.

Louis and his wife, Sadie, raised four children: Robert, Agatha, Edith, and Alvin. Robert "Bob" Glick joined the family business after serving in the Army. Tragically, Sadie passed away in 1939, leaving a lasting impact on the family, particularly on 13-year-old Al. In the aftermath of his mother's passing, Al increasingly relied on his brother Bob for guidance and support. This strong bond ultimately led to their successful partnership in founding Alro Steel.

Al Glick Early Years

Al Glick, born in Jackson, Michigan in 1926, was the youngest of four children. Growing up, he idolized his older brother, Bob, sharing a passion for sports. This early influence fostered Al's competitive spirit and entrepreneurial drive. By age 14 he demonstrated his business acumen by publishing his own sports newspaper, a venture that foreshadowed his future endeavors.

After graduating high school, Al studied journalism at the University of Missouri. He returned to Jackson and joined the family scrap metal business, Glick Iron & Metal, where his father, Louis, granted him an ownership stake. However, Al's entrepreneurial spirit yearned for a new challenge. In 1946, he left Glick Iron & Metal to pursue his passion for sports journalism at the Jackson Citizen Patriot working part-time. His dream was to one day become sports editor.

"What do you have to lose?"

A pivotal moment arrived in 1946 when Al declined a full-time position at the newspaper because it was on the police beat. As Al later reflected, "If the local newspaper had offered me a full-time job as a sportswriter instead of covering the police beat, I would never have started Alro Steel."

This decision would forever alter his trajectory.

Recognizing Al's potential, his brother, Robert, suggested he capitalize on the post-war steel shortage by connecting businesses with excess steel to those in need. When Al expressed his uncertainty, stating "I don't know anything about that," Bob simply replied, "What do you have to lose?" Inspired by his brother's encouragement, Al launched Alsteel Company in 1946 with \$2,500 in investments from his father and brother, granting them a 50% ownership stake in the company. Operating from a garage on the Glick Iron & Metal site, Al began to slowly build his company, laying the foundation of Alro Steel.



1948 Alro Steel Corporation Founded


Alro Steel Corporation was founded on June 1, 1948 on Biddle Street in Jackson, Michigan. Al rented a garage from his father, Louis, adjacent to the Glick Iron & Metal building. Alro Steel would focus on selling prime metal, while Glick Iron & Metal continued to operate as a scrap metal business. The name "Alro" was a fitting tribute to the partnership between the brothers, Alvin and Robert (AL-RO).

Reflecting on the early days, Al Glick humbly acknowledged, "If I knew then what I know now, I would never have had the nerve to start the business." However, with the unwavering support of his brother, Bob, who became a partner in 1948, Alro Steel flourished. Bob, who not only conceived the initial idea for the business but also provided invaluable guidance and support for over fifty-three years, truly earned the "RO" in Alro Steel.

Initially operating from the 3,000 square foot garage, Alro Steel quickly outgrew its space. In 1952, the company relocated to a newly constructed 12,000 square foot facility next door. Over the next two decades, Alro Steel expanded significantly at this location, ultimately reaching a total of 60,000 square feet.

1964 Alro Industrial Supply Founded

Alro Steel took advantage of an expansion opportunity with the purchase of a local industrial and hardware supply company, The Smith-Winchester Company. Through Alro Industrial Supply, customers were now able to buy cutting tools, abrasives, coolant, and MRO supplies. Customers who depended on Alro service for their metal needs supported the move into industrial supplies.

1971 Alro Steel Expands Into Florida

In 1971, Alro Steel expanded its operations into Florida. The company invested in Metals Service Center of Fort Lauderdale and St. Petersburg, with Hirschie Schaffer becoming Alro's partner in the Florida venture. Al applied the same successful service philosophy that had driven Alro Steel's growth in Michigan to these new locations.

Tragically, Hirschie Schaffer would pass away in 1976 unexpectedly at the young age of thirty-six, leaving Al Glick facing a significant challenge in managing the Florida operations from a distance. He asked his nephew Barry to relocate to Florida and manage those operations. This pivotal moment led Barry Glick to assume a greater role in the company's leadership, overseeing the continued growth of Alro's presence in the Florida market.

1975 Alro Steel Moves to Larger Facility in Jackson

To accommodate its expanding customer base, Alro Steel constructed a new facility in 1975 on High Street in Jackson. This larger building provided additional material storage for future growth as well as a more efficient warehouse by streamlining material flow with receiving at one end and shipping at the other.

Driven by the growing demand for plastics within their customer base, Alro expanded its product offerings in 1987 with the establishment of Alro Plastics. This strategic move aimed to provide customers with a single source for their metal, industrial supplies, and plastic requirements.



Founded by Louis Glick and a partner in 1917, Glick Iron & Metal remained a cornerstone of the Glick family for over 70 years. Leadership transitioned through three generations, with Louis' son, Bob, and grandson, Carl, each serving as president. The company was eventually sold in 1987, marking the end of an era for the family-run scrap metal business.

Alro Steel's growth in the 1980s and 1990s necessitated a more efficient distribution model. Recognizing the limitations of its existing system, Alro strategically selected Potterville, Michigan, as a central hub for its operations. This decision, based on thorough analysis and careful planning, enabled Alro to optimize inventory management, improve delivery times, and house unique processing equipment available to all Alro customers.

The Potterville facility has proven to be a cornerstone of Alro's success, undergoing multiple expansions over the years. Today, this state-of-the-art facility, now exceeding 625,000 square feet with an expansion planned for 2026, continues to play a vital role in supporting Alro's growth and enhancing its ability to serve customers across the country.

In 1997, Alro opened its first retail location in Jackson, Michigan, initially named Alro Also and later Alro Metals Plus. These outlets, now numbering over two dozen across ten states, provide a valuable resource for a wide range of customers, from hobbyists and do-it-yourself enthusiasts to small machine shops and maintenance departments.

Initially conceived as a way to utilize remnants and surplus materials from Alro's service centers, the outlets have evolved to offer a comprehensive range of products, including cut-to-size metal and plastic, as well as a variety of related supplies like fasteners, welding rods, and finishing equipment. Customers can easily browse and select materials, and all locations offer on-site processing services, allowing customers to have their materials cut-to-size while they wait.


2018 MFG Lifetime Achievement Award



Louis Glick 1884 - 1967

Louis Glick, the founder of Glick Iron & Metal, passed away in September 1967 at the age of 83. He served as Chairman of the Board of Glick Iron & Metal Co., expanding the company from a small operation employing five individuals to a thriving business with 25 employees by 1967. Beyond his successful business ventures, Louis was a respected community leader, serving as a board member of six Jackson companies.

"He went about doing good quietly and without fanfare," noted the Jackson Citizen Patriot after his passing. "His generous gifts and his strong support for all types of worthy causes generally were known only to the recipients. That was the way he wanted it." Louis was known for his quiet philanthropy and his unwavering support for local businesses. He generously assisted struggling entrepreneurs with loans and business advice, enabling many to establish and sustain their ventures.

In 1968, less than six months after his passing, the city commissioners of Jackson, Michigan, honored Louis Glick by naming a new southeast access route and part of its downtown perimeter loop in his name, Louis Glick Highway. This recognition acknowledged not only his successful business career but also his profound impact on the local community.





Al's lifelong passion for sports deeply influenced his leadership philosophy and his approach to business. His entrepreneurial spirit emerged early on. Al published his own sports newspaper in high school and even considered a career in sports journalism before founding Alro Steel. His love for sports extended beyond his personal interests. He was a dedicated supporter of local youth sports programs including bowling, baseball, softball, and hockey. Additional projects included funding the construction of indoor practice facilities for Jackson High School and the University of Michigan.

There are many things Al will be remembered for, most notably his unmatched love for his family and the University of Michigan. He will be remembered for the company he built, his passion for customer service, and the belief that teamwork is the key to the ongoing success of our company. Al leaves behind a company with a culture built on teamwork, integrity, honesty, and loyalty.


